Summary:

Over the summer and fall of 2019 residents of Tonasket and the surrounding areas were surveyed about issues related to the city, police force, library, and communication. The purpose of this survey was to gain a better understanding of the needs and perspectives of our community members.

This survey was created with an estimated 25 hours of volunteer labor. With multiple communication avenues (described in more detail in the Methodology section) every attempt was made to contact as many city residents and business owners as possible. With over 200 respondents, only 78 residents of the city limit completed the survey. The City of Tonasket plays an important role in all local residents, even the ones that live outside of the city limits. This reality was echoed in the data with multiple comments of frustration about being unable to vote in city elections despite working in or living directly outside of the city.

On many topics, there is a wealth of diverse viewpoints. The topics of the Perfect Passage and Law Enforcement have even divided opinions and have major implications for the future of Tonasket.

In the responses of many questions, the need for better communication was expressed.

Additionally, the challenge of getting accurate information especially for citizens that are unable to attend meetings but still want to hear before the rumor mill adds embellishments.

This survey found a community that has a large sense of pride and wants to continue to enjoy the aspects of their home that brought them here. It is my hope that as a city we can leverage the findings of this survey to improve our community, find solutions, and continue to build a better Tonasket.

Methodology:

The survey was presented in English and Spanish from April 2019 to November 2019. It was distributed in paper copies at local businesses, door to door, and city meetings. An online version was distributed via www.tonasket.org and Facebook.

The following adjustments were made to the data to protect the identity of individuals and to accommodate analysis:

- 1. Survey responses with 90% or more questions unanswered were removed (2 surveys)
- 2. Survey responses that targeted a particular city employee, elected official, or private citizen were edited to either "elected official", "city employee", or "private citizen" These changes are noted in Red in the data set. (12 surveys)
- 3. Spanish responses were translated into English. These changes are noted in Orange in the data set. (2 surveys)


The full data set is available at www.tonasket.org with minor edits as described above.

This was not a scientific study and the results should be interpreted as an informal survey. Based on the response rates and demographic disclosures it is evident that the survey results do not represent all groups. For example, no respondents reported being younger than 21, or older than 80. Additionally, the survey distribution method may have favored certain populations instead of a true random sampling.


Who Took the Survey:

There were 203 responses, of which 78 or 38% live within the Tonasket City limits.

Of the 125 respondents that live outside of the city limits, 66 more reported that either they or a member of their household work within the city limits. This brings the total of respondents with direct ties to the city to 70%.




Of all respondents, the vast majority live in the 98855 zip code.

The majority of the respondents rated Tonasket highly as a place to live.




The respondents were given the opportunity to leave open-ended comments about what they like about Tonasket. 168 responses included comments that were categorized into the following areas:




Many comments focused on the benefits of a small town and the community that exists in Tonasket.

Two questions were asked about the size of the library and the potential relocation of the library from its current location adjacent to the city hall.






Safety and Law Enforcement:


In January 2019 the Tonasket Police Department was disbanded and a contract was signed with the Okanogan County Sheriff to provide services to the city limits.

To gauge how safe citizens felt in Tonasket the survey asked: "How safe do you feel walking alone in Tonasket after dark?"




Overall the results suggest that most respondents felt safe, but the results varied when sorted by demographics.

Respondents aged 51-60 felt the least safe after dark in Tonasket:



When asked about the performance of the Sheriff's Department a plurality of respondents felt it was "Too early to tell".

Perfect Passage:

The Perfect Passage (previously called The Magnificent Mile) project is a proposed Downtown Corridor Redevelopment Project that is focused on Whitcomb Ave between the two Siwash Creek and Bonaparte Creek. The project seeks to rebuild stormwater infrastructure and regrade the streets to prevent flooding, create ADA access, and relocated utilities under the street.

Respondents were asked, "Are you familiar with the project?"

- 114 (56%) responded "No"
- 88 (44%) responded "Yes"

Of the 88 "yes" responses, they were asked if they supported the project:



Most respondents listed multiple methods of staying in touch with the news in Tonasket. The most common responses were Facebook, Newspapers, and in-person communication or meeting attendance.¹
